How Can I be a *light*?

This Channukah, we are challenging you to be a light in the dark, bringing peace and justice to your family, the community, and our world. Inside your box, you will find materials to create your own Mikdash Me'at, your special Channukah space. Your Mikdash Me'at will create a beautifully decorated "frame" on your window, in which you will write or create a message & blessing for the world.

As Jews, we are commanded to be a light onto all other peoples. While your art box will help you create a physical display, there is more to do in order to truly be a light. By helping those who are in need, bringing justice into the world, and following in the footsteps of our Ancestors, we can be a light to other people, our families, and ourselves.

Other cultures use light to show compassion and peace to others. Look outside your window during Channukah and you might see your neighbors using lights to celebrate their holiday. We can all bring light into the world in our own way.



Creating your **Mikdash Me'at**

Traditionally, Jews place their Channukah Menorahs in their windowsills, where anyone walking or driving past your house can see. We hope the bright and creative materials in your box help you build a display in your home, on your windowsill, or wherever someone going past your home can see. Kehal Kodesh will make this together on Sunday, December 6th. Make sure you have your RockBocks nearby during T'filah!

What's in the Box?

- 2 Chalk Glass Markers (safe for windows & kids)
- 1 Bottles of Glow in the Dark Puffy Paint (only for rocks)
- 1 Stand Up & Speak Out Sticker (for your car or elsewhere)
- 2 Holiday Stencils
- Channukah Candles
- Dreidels & Gelt



Glowing Pathway

This Channukah, you have materials to create a glowing pathway, a way to show that your home is a welcoming place this Channukah.

Start by collecting some rocks, you might have some around your house, or you can go find some in your backyard or park.

Once you have your rocks, take a paper towel and wipe them down, removing any dirt that may have come in from outside.

After your rocks dry, take the glow in the dark puffy paint from your box and begin painting. Make sure you paint on a piece of paper or newspaper, this paint will stain your clothes or other surfaces. What designs, words, or symbols will you use on your rocks? How will you show that your home, even from a distance, is welcoming and peaceful this Channukah?

Once you've painted your rocks, let them dry in a brightly lit place, like near a lamp. Once they've dried, place them on your doorstep, a path near your front door, or anywhere else to display your artful creations. At night, especially after a sunny day, you'll see your rocks glowing outside, welcoming people into your home.

How can justice and peace sometimes struggle with each other?

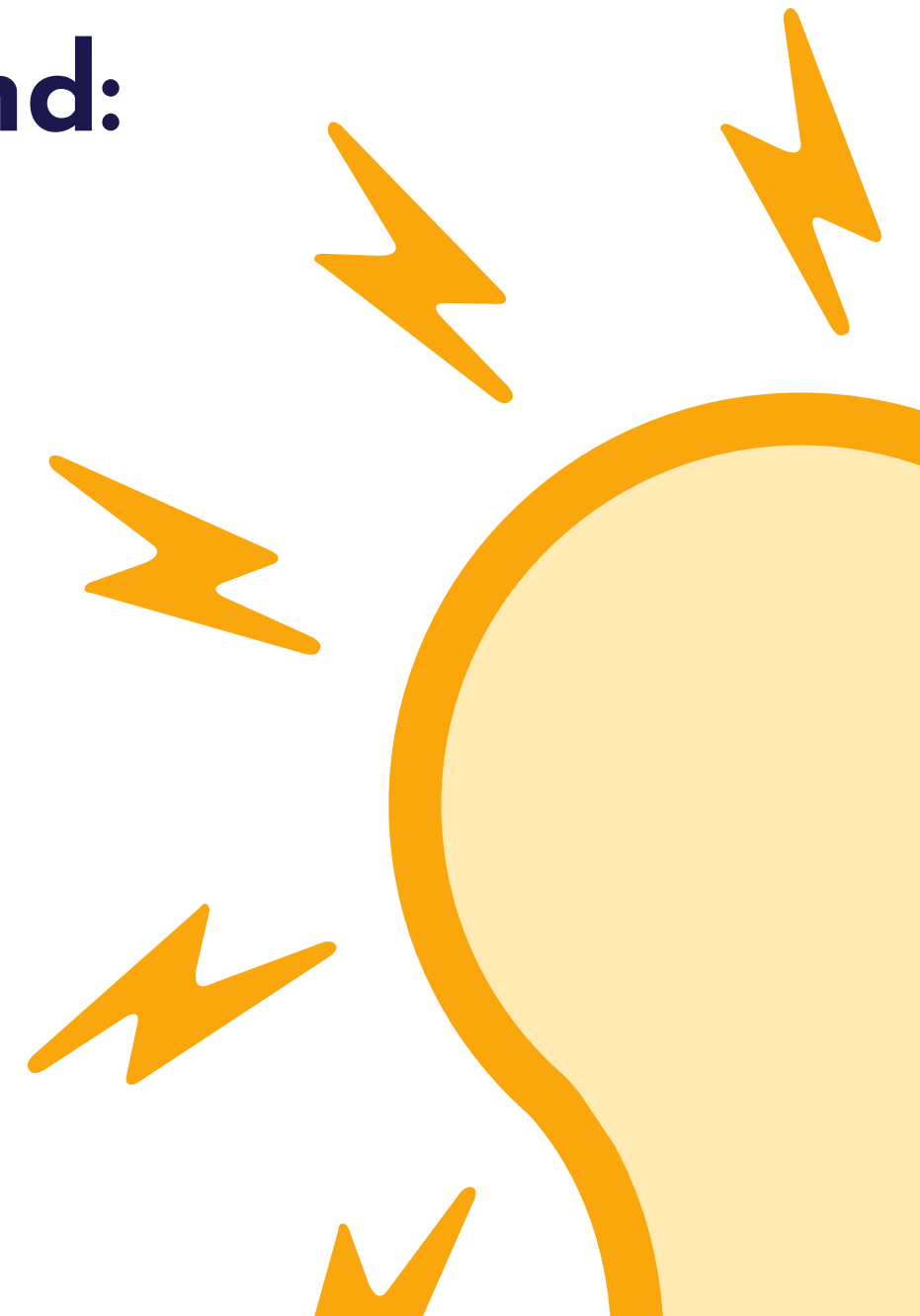
What are some ways that you can be a light to the world this Channukah?
